CALL TO ORDER

Attorney Albert Cruz, and Borough Clerk, Brenda S. Shepherd, were present for the Meeting. 13 members of the public were also present.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

The Council approved to open the public comment session.

Don Seigle of Everittstown Road thanked Councilman William Sullivan for getting that street light taken down that has been shining in his house for 20 years. He observed that people are going slower since the light is not there. His wife counted the street lights from end of Frenchtown toward Clinton and there are 6 street lights. They are not cheap.

Henry Rey of Creek Road noted that Creek Road has holes and the water lays in the road. Public Works has brought stone there but they need to use a shovel to fill the holes. On Ridge Road, the ditches were not cleaned out and someone cleaned it out and left the debris in the road. There is also tree branches hanging in the road and you hit them with a truck. Mayor Myhre responded that William Sullivan will look into the issues of Creek Road. Drainage will be addressed with the Ridge Road Reconstruction project.

As to the sewer charges for the American Legion, Henry Rey noted that nothing on the sewer survey pertains to the American Legion. He has filled it out in the past and given it to the committee but no one has looked into it. William Sullivan asked that he fill out the form for the American Legion.

Mayor Myhre noted that the committee will take a look to see if there is any mechanism for relief. If there is relief, it would apply to all non-profits. Henry Rey added that they are open six hours a day and the use is like a household. Mayor Myhre noted that the Committee had discussed billing according to water usage. The Borough did not do that because we had to come up with the money for the debt service.

Liz Johnson of Second Street noted that she was asked by neighbors to bring to the Borough's attention that Frenchtown's 150th Anniversary is next year. If the Borough would like to form a committee, she will help organize that. Mayor Myhre noted that he has had a conversation with the Fire Department and they will put the committee together.

Ed Jazowski of Cedar Street noted that the town did a survey with regard to the Master Plan. Will they do it again? Mayor Myhre responded that it goes through the Planning Board.

Henry Rey asked about the Memorial Day parade approval. Mayor Myhre noted that the Council did not receive anything from the American Legion. He recommended that the American Legion work with the Chief and to let the Borough know if you need anything.

Bob Haver of Third Street noted that he received a call from someone in Alexandria about connecting to Frenchtown's sewer. It might be worth looking into. He added that Phillipsburg does it with Lopatcong. Jack Opdyke noted that the building is not in the Borough's sewer service area. The Borough would have to change the sewer service area. And, it is on a County road as well.

Mayor Myhre noted that the Council will be going into executive session this evening in regard to River Mills.

Having no other public comments, the Mayor and Common Council closed the public comment session.

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of the Borough of Frenchtown, in the County of Hunterdon, finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2016 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that a 3.5% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$48,234.20 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove

that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Frenchtown, in the County of Hunterdon, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2016 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of Frenchtown shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$48,234.20 and that the CY 2016 municipal budget for the 3.5% be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

1977 APPROPRIATIONS "CAPS" CALCULATION

N.J.S.40A:4-45.1 et. seq. "The Local Government Cap Law" places limits on municipal expenditures. Commonly referred to as the "CAPS", it is actually calculated by a method established by the law.

In general the actual calculation works as follows. Starting with the figure in the 2015 budget for Total General Appropriations certain 2015 budget figures are subtracted; including the reserve for uncollected taxes, debt service, State and Federal aid, etc. Take the resulting figure and multiply it by 1.50% and this gives you the basic "CAP" or the amount of appropriations increase allowed over the 2015 Total General Appropriations. The Total General Appropriations may also be increased by 3.5%, if prior, to the introduction of the 2015 budget an index rate ordinance is approved by the governing body.

In addition to the increase allowed above, any increase funded by increase valuations from new construction or improvements is also allowed.

Also, the "CAPS" may be exceeded if approved by referendum. The actual "CAPS" for this municipality will be reviewed and approved by the Division of Local Government Services in the State Department of Community Affairs, but the calculations upon which this budget was prepared are as follows:

As to Everittstown Road passing zone, the Freeholders noted that there is no engineering reason to overriding the passing zone but they have indicated that they would be willing to do that as well.

Cathy Leach reported that at the Annual Park Clean Up on the 26th, there were more than 40 people who volunteered. Everyone worked hard and it looks fantastic. Eric Ferrida did repairs to the merry-go round and removed the smaller merry go round. Scott Johnson also helped. She thanked

Eric and Scott and also thanked everyone in the community for their support.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

As to the Sewer Plant, Jack Opyke reported that there are still some open items on the punchlist, the UV lamps are taller than the old ones, the disk filters, and the software update has not been installed. Everything else has been completed. In the Council packet, you will find Victor Gilardi's detailed report.

Michele Liebtag noted that there has been a lot of discussion about the blue trash and recycling receptacles downtown. The Borough has clean communities grant money and we are working to have the receptacles replaced. The Downtown Revitalization Committee report indicates the product that the committee selected. We are moving forward on it. Mayor Myhre added that the new trash contract with RVD has the company picking up the downtown receptacles. It is a great benefit to the Borough as far as manpower.

CORRESPONDENCE/ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mayor Myhre noted that the Borough received an email from the Freeholder Board that they are taking their meetings on the road and would like to host one in Frenchtown Borough. We will work with them on the date provided that Borough Hall is open. Clerk Shepherd will coordinate a date.

Referring to the Memorandum from the zoning officer, William Sullivan stated that he spoke with the zoning officer about the permit situation and the zoning officer provided a response. It would not require an amendment to the Land Use Ordinance but could be done by administrative action of the Mayor and Council. William Sullivan asked that this be added the next meeting's agenda.

Mayor Myhre reported that in addition to the Freeholders doing their meetings on the road, Freeholder Director LaGay and Freeholder Holt are doing the Comprehensive Economic Development survey results for the County's future and they are taken that to the different municipalities. They would like to bring that to Frenchtown as well. Mayor Cooper participated on the CEDS committee. They are highlighting the river towns and what we have here. He thinks it would be good for Frenchtown to host one of those events. We will contact Josie Glynn to see if they could come before the June meeting.

Caroline Scutt noted that there was focus groups being done around the Open Space and asked if anyone from the Environmental Commission was going. Jim Meade noted that the Environmental Commission is aware of it but he does not know if anyone was attending. Caroline Scutt stated that the are looking at the Open Space in conjunction with the County Master Plan. Mayor Myhre asked if someone from the Environmental Commission could attend. Jim Meade noted that Holly Lowe posted it and may be going.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mayor Myhre noted that the Council will go into executive session to discuss the following:
